

I must admit that this book is probably not the best one on the market. It is not very usable by beginners. My own experience of self taught MFC programmer goes back to windows 3.1, when I tried to port a little shareware program I developed under Visual Basic 3 to Visual C++ 1.5. It took me about one year to do so. Now, I routinely develop applications for technical purposes. (Man-machine interface evaluation software for silicon chips). But here I want to emphasize one very important point about the original author. Without his dedication and patience, I would certainly have stopped everything. On the original edition of this book, Inside Visual C++ 1.5, there was his email address. And when I came to a dead end, I send to him queries, and he answered me! His help

was unvaluable to me. This was my two cents contribution to the memory of an author who really cared about his readers.

1) This book has broad coverage on all major topics relating to programming with MFC 2) It has detailed step-by-step instructions of how to do something using MFC 3) It doesn't have enough information of why you want to follow the steps 4) If you are a seasoned programmer already somewhat familiar with the topics involved (Win32, C++, MFC, OLE, etc.), this books leaves you hanging feeling like the author only expects you to have a high-school level education, and like you were cheated for buying the book. 5) This is like "detailed step-by-step instruction of how to fish", "very little detail about why you want to fish in a certain way" book. 6) This is probably a good book for people starting to learn how to program in Windows using MFC. 7) If you are intermediate/advanced programmer, you money will be better-spent on other books.

I am an experienced C++ programmer, but have given up after 8 chapters of this book. The author offers reams of code with little explanation. Particularly annoying is the constant introduction of MFC functions with little explanation of what they do, and skimpy discussion of what the applications do. It may be OK for a more experienced VC++ programmer, or if you want to spend endless weeks grinding through code that you can only marginally understand. Question -- why doesn't someone write a guide that provides sample problem applications -- that would certainly facilitate the learning process.

I was a little disappointed when I received the book and saw that it was 3 years old and targeted for Visual C++ Version 5.0. But it turns out it is covers pretty much everything you need to know to use MFC to write windows programs. Make sure you are comfortable with the C++ language and Object-Oriented concepts first though.

I was somewhat disappointed with this book as it didn't explain enough of what was going on. The examples are far too dependent on VC++'s application wizards, which write horrible code that is very difficult to decifer. If you are a "do it yourself" programmer (like myself), who hates the wizards, this is not the book to get. It does a very good job for introducing one to the concepts of VC++ 5, but if you are wanting to LEARN HOW TO do higher end programming find another source since this books fails to explain how many things are really being done. "Just trust us" seems to be a common theme.

While this book is loaded with examples, it relies so heavily on Visual C++'s wizards that it really doesn't give you any idea of how the MFC works. After all, if you are just going to use wizards to do everything, you should be programming in Visual Basic. If you are new to MFC and really want to understand it, I recommend MFC From the Ground Up by Herb Schildt. Although Schildt's book doesn't focus on Visual C++ specifically, it gives you the background knowledge and understanding you'll need if you want to use VC++ effectively.

Pros: It guides you through building example codes using VC++ 5. Example qualties are good to excellent in that all CD-ROM stuff I tried compiled and worked error free. If you never used VC 5.0 before, this book gives you a practical step-by-step instructions on how to use the tools such as debugger, class wizards, help system. Also there are some good tips on how to debug in-process and out-of-process OLE/COM/ActiveX components. Cons: I share other reviewers in that this book seem to lack some depth in describing the example implementations fully. The part of the problem is that the book does not really give you the overview of the architecture of the MFC and its "in-house" conventions. Instead, the book dive straight into the tour of examples. Summary: This is a excellent introduction to learn how to use Visual C++ 5.0 with MFC, but this book will not give you an in-depth coverage of MFC. Manabu Tokunaga, ACUSON Corporation

Buy this book if you want to get an overview of alot of the features of Visual C++5. If you want to learn MFC, I would recommend Programming Windows 95 with MFC by Jeff Prosise. Be aware that this book by Prosise isn't an easy to read book
